**CATALOG DESCRIPTION:**

This course focuses on the gospel, the economy of salvation, the incarnation of the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The course begins by treating the human condition as now fallen, and sin as the backdrop of the gospel. Attention then turns to the work of Christ, particularly the atonement and accomplishment of redemption as the content of the gospel. The course then considers the application and consummation of redemption by examining the work of the Holy Spirit, the nature, mission, and destiny of the church as the gathered people of God as the climax of the gospel. The course concludes with a consideration of how the gospel story ends for believers and unbelievers in the glory of God's being all in all in the new heavens and the new earth, (3 units).

**OBJECTIVES:**

1. Learn the major arguments, options and biblical texts related to the doctrines of Sin, Christ, Salvation, the Holy Spirit, the Church, and the End Times.
2. Gain an appreciation of historical development and contemporary importance of these doctrines.
3. Grow in the understanding and application of these doctrines to the Christian life and walk.
4. To learn to communicate these truths as one exposit God's Word.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

1. Midterm and Final Exams – The Midterm will be given in class on the third weekend. The final exam will be a take-home and will be due two weeks after the final class. The exams will include ten short answer and one essay question derived in part from a study list that will be provided. The midterm will be worth 25% of the grade and the final will be worth 25%.
2. Paper: Each student will write a 10-page research paper on a topic related to the course material. The student must clear the topic with the professor. The paper is due with the final exam. The paper is worth 25% of the grade for the course.
3. Readings: All readings must be completed by the time of the final exam. Please include a statement of readings completed with the final exam. The readings count for 25% of the grade.

## **ATTENDANCE:**

Each student is expected to attend 100% of the class sessions. If unforeseen circumstances necessitate an absence you have the responsibility of notifying the professor ahead of time and making arrangements with colleagues to get the class notes. If you should miss more than one weekly session you will be in danger of having points deducted from your final grade.
